School Notes

At the Lincoln Music Festival, Ermine Junior School Choir won the Dunhill Trophy for Junior Choirs. The choir, which was trained by Miss Pikett, consisted of 32 4th. year boys and girls, and they gained 92 marks, the highest award of the whole Festival.

The Choral speaking group, trained by Mr. R. A. Dickinson, gained the second prize in its class.

On June 7th there will be a school outing to London for 120 children and 60 parents and staff. There will be a bus trip round the West End, and a river trip from Richmond to Hampton Court, where the party will be shown round.

Next year's trip is already in hand, and it will

include a two-hour cruise on the Broads, the remainder of the day being spent at Lowestoft.

The Infants' School now has a record attendance of 430 children in a school designed for 360. Fortunately they are able to use two of the "hut" classrooms for the time being, but these may eventually be needed for the Junior School.

Half term will be the whole of Whit-week, and term ends on July 24th. Next term starts on September 3rd.

A Parent-Teacher Meeting will be held on Wednesday, May 14th, at the Junior School at 7-30 p.m. The subject for debate is "Popular education has been tried and found wanting." The principal speakers will be Councillor A. Briggs and Councillor C. A. Lillicrap.
