# AMNESTY INTERNATIONAL

# A Movement for the Freedom of Opinion and Religion

On behalf of the local Group of Three of Amnesty International I would like to thank your Parochial Church Council so very much for the extremely generous gift of Five Pounds. We were quite overwhelmed to receive it, perhaps more particularly as I know that you have many heavy commitments within the parish. Thank you so very much.

Our funds at present are mostly being spent on the families of two African prisoners. The first, Paul Joseph, is an Indian in Johannesburg. He was imprisoned under the ninety day detention laws in July and just at the end of the ninety days he was charged with belonging to a banned organisation. This case has been adjourned several times and his wife writes that she fears it may well be January or February before it is heard. In the meantime he is bringing a case against the police, asking for an injunction to refrain them from using illegal methods in the prison and from questioning him in such a manner as is liable to injure his physical and mental health. (Two prisoners in this gaol have committed suicide). His wife has been left absolutely destitute, with four small children. The eldest, a boy of five, is a very bad spastic who cannot sit up or feed himself. There are no institutions for coloured spastic children in South Africa where he can be received for treatment. Mrs. Joseph suffers from a weak heart and is nearly at the end of her tether with all the worry. Her husband has been remanded in custody and our group has cabled the Minister of Justice asking for bail on compassionate grounds, but we have received no reply. We also cabled him asking for assurance that the rumours of ill treatment in the prisons were untrue, but to this also we have had no reply.

Since July we have been sending Five Pounds a month to Mrs. Joseph to help her support the family, as well as some clothes for the children and a Christmas parcel.

The other African prisoner is Phillip Madzvimbo of Southern Rhodesia, who was detained for a year without trial. He has left behind him a wife, a little boy of two and twins, who at that time were only a month old. The wife and children are living with an uncle in the country and the government will do nothing to assist them. We have been sending Sophie Madzvimbo Three Pounds a month, and she refuses to spend any of this on herself, saying it is to be used for soap, milk and clothes for the children. Phillip writes of his wife: "Sophie has a very strong heart and she sympathises with me very much. Despite all the difficulties involved Sophie has always encouraged me and any success I have in life I owe all that to her". We have also sent clothes for the whole family (including two matinee jackets for the twins from the St. John's Autumn Fair) and a great many paperback books to Phillip which are much appreciated and are passed round the whole

As your present was so generous and so unexpected, after discussing the matter with members of the group we have decided to send three pounds to the Josephs and two pounds to the Madzvimbo, so that the mothers can spend it on something special for Christmas for the children. It will come, not from Amnesty, but from the Parish of St. John, Ermine. I do hope that they will approve of our using the money in this way.

# Gift of Prayer Books

Philip, Fourth Lord Wharton, a devout Presbyterian, was born 1613, died 1696.

Philip, Lord Wharton had that best start in life, a godly-home, but his good father died when he was nine years of age, though his pious mother lived till he was forty-one.

At one time, having displeased the king, he was imprisoned in the Tower, but he lived to welcome William III and to become one of his Privy Councillors.

Six years before his death he began distributing Bibles to children. He loved the Psalms and encouraged the children to learn some of his favourite ones; and in his will he left 463 acres of land at Sinningthwaite, in Yorkshire, to carry on this work. So, for over 260 years, boys and girls have had Bibles given to them because this earnest Christian nobleman wanted them to know and to love the Word of God.

St. John's Parish receive six Bibles and six Prayer Books each year.
