Foundation Stone laid by Bishop of Lincoln.




Gifts began to come in, but

BUDGET EXPENSES

If we are to BUILD on our Foundations we cannot cut down on our expenses.



- 1. Two priests are an absolute minimum for our young Parish of 10,000 souls.
- 2. We must light, heat, clean and keep in repair our existing premises.
- 3. We must pay running expenses, telephone, printing, transport, etc.
- 4. We must keep up our Sanctuary, Choir, Sunday Schools and organisations.

ALL THIS WILL COST, WE ESTIMATE, £29 A WEEK OVER THE NEXT THREE YEARS

and also

BUILDING OUR NEW CHURCH

Stage One (now under construction)

We have raised £3,000
We have grants of £18,000
Total Cost of Stage One
\$\frac{£21,000}{£24,000}\$
So we still need
£3,000

Stage Two (vestries, chapel, belfry)

Estimated cost £10,000

So to complete the church we must raise £13,000 or £84 a week for three years only.

And we must raise it as soon as possible.

Delay will either hold up building (which is unthinkable, isn't it?).

Or involve us in expensive borrowing and debts (which is bad stewardship).

HOW YOU CAN HELP

These are big sums of money—how is the amount to be raised?

Don't despair—think of what has been done already in six years from scratch and go on DOING YOUR SHARE till it hurts, and believing that others will be moved by the Holy Spirit to do the same.

Questions and Answers

* * *

- Q. Do we need to spend as much as 5/- per week for each active family just to run our Church?
- A. Certainly—a mean run-down way of doing things is not good enough for God's work.
- Q. Surely the Church is State-supported or at least financed by the Church Commissioners?
- A. No, indeed, the State does NOT support the Church in any way, and the bulk of the large income which the Church Commissioners receive from their investments is used to pay Clergy of all Orders. Parochial expenses are in the main the responsibility of the parishioners.
- Q. £29 a week and £13,000 as well! Is such an amount possible in this parish?
- A. Yes, certainly. Hundreds of other Churches up and down the country are working in this way and proving that it is entirely possible.
- Q. Are we told how much we must give?
- A. Certainly not! Only you and your family can decide this. We ask only that your decision should be given sincere thought, remembering that the generosity of your gift will be the measure of your personal love of your Church.
- Q. Why are we required to pledge a definite amount?
- A. In our own homes most of us have an assured regular income and can budget for the future. The Church needs to be able to do the same.
- Q. When we make a pledge, does the Church hold us to it in all circumstances?
- A. No. Pledges are made voluntarily and in good faith. In the event of loss of income, through illness, for instance, the family may reduce or even cancel its pledge until the emergency is past and income is back to normal.
- Q. Is it better to pledge than to give generously in our own way?
- A. Yes, infinitely better. Even the best intentioned of us needs self-discipline in a matter of this kind.
