NEW LINCOLN CHURCH MUST 'BE WORTHY'

VERY few of the 8,000 people living in the parish of St. John, Ermine Estate, Lincoln, would, for one moment, accept the title "atheist," said Canon V. J. Dalby, at St. John's Church Hall, last night.

He was speaking at a special service held to mark the beginning of the year of building of St. John's Parish Church, Lincoln, work on which is expected to start at the latter end of the spring.

Among the congregation, by special invitation were the Mayor and Mayoress of Lincoln, Councillor and Mrs W. E. Herbert, as well as clergy from many other churches in the city.

One would imagine, said Canon Dalby, that any human being, aware that God lived, would immediately see that nothing else in life could be more important. Yet, he continued, people were blind, did not see, and needed the church to show them.

"There is no limit to the love of God, and that is what your church on this estate is to proclaim. The church which will be built here will proclaim to every man, woman and child on this estate that God loves each and every one of them, and that there is no limit to His love.

NEEDED A HOME

"We cannot be content until there is a building devoted solely to God and His worship."

The Christian Church, he said, was, first and foremost, people who must be alive with the love of God. If they were to be a family in the true sense of the word, then they needed a home which was specifically designed for a definite purpose.

When the people of God build their church they build one designed to be of use within and without, to speak to the people round about and proclaim to everyone who saw it, "God is the most important fact in life."

"If the building is mean and ineagre," he continued, "is it not saying in bricks and mortar much louder than in words, 'The Christian people believe that the worship of God is not very important?'"

A dual purpose building, useful and extremely valuable as such things were, was not the real answer. It was no use having God one sixth or one seventh part of a building.

VALUE OF WORSHIP

"If the building erected is innoek Gothic, or built in Victorian style, is it not saying that worship is of a bygone age? If the people of the parish do not care enough to build a church which is worthy, they are saying that their worship is not very important.

"That is why this parish must have a church which is set apart, where people can come in any and every day to worship—a building that will speak to the people of the parish in its very structure, and say 'The worship of God is so important in this place that the people must have a building given over to no other purpose than the worship of God.'"

Canon Dalby continued, "That is why money must be given and raised; why there must be sacrifices on the part of the Christian people—so that this can be said of every soul in the parish."

DIFFICULT TASK

The people of the parish, he said, had a difficult task before them, to find all that was needed to make the place worthy.

"They can, and will do it, not for their own glory, but to the glory of God, and because they know how much God loves them."
